
Required Minimum Distributions

Did You Know? If you are 70 ½ or older, you can give any amount up to \$100,000 each year from your IRA directly to Victory without having to pay income taxes on the gift. Your gift can satisfy all or part of your **Required Minimum Distribution** and you will see the impact of your generosity today. No matter your age, you can designate Victory as the beneficiary of all or a percentage of your IRA. As a taxexempt religious organization, we receive your gift tax-free.

Consider these advantages:

- Avoid taxes on transfers of up to \$100,000 from your IRA to Victory
- ► Satisfy your required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year
- ► Reduce your income, even if you do not itemize deductions

An Unexpected Fruit

Prayer: Lord help us reconcile what we've seen in people's suffering.

As part of the 2024 South Africa Mission **ORCHARD**: AFRICA Team, that prayer has stuck with me.

We see the suffering and want to do something, but then we go home and they are still left dealing with it. What can we do? We start off by looking at hope and seeing the answer to prayer and sharing our own stories. Pastor Todd suggested, "Part of what we can do when we get back is to communicate some of our experience to others." So, when I returned back home I began to share the experience with a loved one who is incarcerated. Over the course of a week I emailed, sent photos and included condensed 30 second video clips of the trip. In return, my friend shared with me how he was deeply moved by what he had seen. Included here is the letter he wrote.

To the Congregation,

In the Arizona Department of Corrections, it is said, and rightly so, that the prisoners run the prisons. The inmates in this state have seen fit, for several decades now, to operate these facilities along racial boundaries. The day to day life of the prisoner is lived in a completely segregated society. One's race dictates where he may sit in the chow hall and with whom he may eat, what section of the rec field he may occupy and with whom he may exercise, even who he may befriend. Experience has taught the convict that without a strict and unforgiving code, the prison yard would quickly

devolve into chaos. Therefore, the consequences for disregarding these rules would shock the free person with their brutality.

I am approaching my fourteenth consecutive year of incarceration in this system. Upon arrival, the first-time felon is placed under the instruction of an older, more experienced convict for his indoctrination into this new world. I have often been this teacher.

Just recently I was instructing a new arrival, a youth, in the rules and regulations of his new segregated institutional life. When I saw a certain expression darken his features I told him not to worry, that in time he would come to accept these rules, then, by increments, become numb to them, until finally, he'd come to promote them. Once he lost a bit of his humanity, I explained, he'd come to see the wisdom in racism. I actually spoke these words with my own

mouth. And up until a few days ago . . . I believed them.

Then my dear friend, Eileen, returned from Africa. I began receiving what would ultimately be seven short videos and five emails. Each video was 30 seconds long. The emails arrived with attachments containing five pictures each. I was struck with awe at such selfless demonstrations of kindness and service. I saw the joyful hopping and clapping of the children, their excitement at being the centers of attention, I heard their joyful chatter. And my heart was softened. Here in this place of concrete and iron bars, steel security mesh and chain link fence, to my shame, I almost cried.

I scrolled through the pictures and found myself inexplicably returning over and over again to one photo in particular. It was a picture of two men, one black and one white, walking together hand in hand. The first time I saw it I was shocked. They

> were holding hands! It was almost incomprehensible to me. The image didn't arouse my contempt, as one would expect. It wasn't base or crude, but pure, as if they themselves were also children. I felt as if I had caught sight of a flash of light from another kingdom — that this is what it will be like in heaven! Even now, the feelings and thoughts exceed my ability to express them. It's as if I had witnessed the stroke of a feather used to demolish a wall — the wall of a hardened heart. And that part of my own humanity, lost to me

years ago, was restored.

Only days ago I was present at a meeting where I described the

sights and sounds of your mission and how they made me think and feel. I extended the offer to view these pictures and videos to anyone who cared to. Since then, men of other housing units have been sneaking past security devices and slipping through sally gates to get to my building. So far, none who have seen these proofs of your noble ministry have failed to be deeply moved.

So I've composed this humble letter to thank you. And to assure you that your ministry has touched more people than you may have thought, in more far away places than you may have expected.

May God bless you and smile upon you. May God turn his face to shine upon you. And give you peace.

I-HELP - A Channel for God's Grace Bev Locke, VLC Coordinator for 13 years

In 2010, the City of Mesa, Mesa United Way, and Lutheran Social Services of the Southwest joined forces to address the growing number of single, homeless women in Mesa. Their collaboration led to the creation of the Interfaith Emergency Lodging Program (I-HELP), with local congregations recruited to support this mission. Initially, the program was minimal, providing shelter only a few nights a week. By December 2010, ten churches were on board, allowing I-HELP to offer shelter year-round. Women would sleep on army cots in church spaces, the only emergency shelter available for women at that time.

Victory Lutheran Church became a dedicated partner, joining the program in 2011. With the support of the Victory Lutheran Church Women (VLCW), the church provided essentials like sheets, towels, and blankets. Initially, a van brought up to 25 women to Victory every other Thursday, where they would set up cots and bedding before settling in for the night. A volunteer oversaw the arrivals and

departures, ensuring the church's doors were open and closed safely.

The program quickly expanded through the efforts of compassionate congregations and volunteers. Victory's involvement grew to include not only shelter but also sack lunches, meals, and inflatable beds to replace the cots as they wore out. LSS-SW increased case

management services to help participants develop plans for returning to stability. Over the years, I-HELP has served more than 2,000 women, helping many regain a stable life.

Victory became a preferred location for participants, offering amenities like showers, Wi-Fi, TV, comfortable beds, and nutritious meals. The church provided breakfast, lunch, and dinner during each stay, along with a safe, welcoming environment, including a secure patio for group gatherings. The women came to refer to their time at Victory as a "stay at the Hilton." Volunteers ensured that each guest felt treated as an honored guest, contributing to a comprehensive program that involved up to 20 volunteers each month.

The COVID-19 pandemic brought new challenges, reducing the number of participants from 25-30 to about 12. Health precautions were implemented, with linens taken to a laundromat for thorough



involvement, Victory continued to welcome women, adapting the program to allow 15 participants to stay two consecutive nights twice a month. This arrangement helped them attend appointments or interviews without the burden of daily relocation.

Through it all, the program remained a model of how a congregation can share God's love in tangible ways. The case manager from Lutheran Social Services used Victory's facilities for private meetings

with participants to discuss their progress. Witnessing the strength, resilience, and faith of the women has been a humbling experience for volunteers, who were enriched through their service and the relationships formed along the way.

However, change is inevitable. As of October 31, 2024, the City of Mesa will no longer provide stable funding for I-HELP, redirecting

federal grant money to a centralized "bricks and mortar" shelter. This shift will allow clients to receive services in a single location, reducing the need for daily moves. While this transition will benefit the women in some ways, they will miss the personalized care provided by the congregations. The program's assets will be redirected to other local ministries and charities, including I-HELP in the West Valley, to continue supporting people experiencing homelessness.

A heartfelt thank you goes out to everyone who has contributed to this ministry over the years.

Your time, talent, and generosity made it possible for Victory to go above and beyond, providing not just shelter but also grants for education, training, licensing, and other support to help participants rebuild their lives. Together, we have made a difference in many lives, and the spirit of I-HELP will live on through other programs and initiatives at Victory and beyond.
