Opener:

Share a moment in your life when your perspective about someone or something completely changed. What caused that

Go Deeper:

- 1. How did Saul's background and actions make him seem like an unlikely candidate for God's grace? Discuss specific examples from the text.
 - 2. In what ways did God's intervention on the road to Damascus change Saul's life immediately and completely?
 - 3. What role did Ananias play in Saul's transformation? How did his obedience to God's call demonstrate faith?
 - 4. Reflect on the significance of Jesus' words, "Why do you persecute me?" What does this reveal about Jesus' connection to His followers?
 - 5. How does Saul's story challenge our preconceived notions about who is deserving of grace and redemption?

Live It:

- 1. Think about someone in your life whom you've written off as beyond redemption. How might God be calling you to see them differently?
 - 2. In what areas of your life do you need to trust God's vision over your own fears and prejudices?
 - 3. How can you be an "Ananias" to someone who is in need of grace and support? What practical steps can you take this week?
 - 4. Reflect on your own journey of faith. How has God's grace interrupted and transformed vour life?
- 5. Consider the risky obedience shown by Ananias. In what ways can you demonstrate similar faith and courage in your daily life?

GOD TIME: Jesus Took His Place... and Ours

My nephew has had a resurgence in his interest in faith as the result of a major car crash. During a drive, he asked if I'd ever heard of Barabbas. I smiled — I've been studying the Bible for 35 years — and he proceeded to play a TikTok sermon about the crowd choosing to release Barabbas instead of Jesus.

After listening in silence, he turned to me and said, "I had no idea that Jesus chose to die for us." I was a little stunned. He's heard me preach countless times, but something in that simple sermon broke through. The truth of the Gospel—the idea that Jesus willingly took our place—landed in his heart in a fresh, powerful way.

The world saw Barabbas walk free because of a public vote. But the truth is deeper. Pilate didn't save Barabbas. The crowd didn't either. Jesus did. He placed Himself into the hands of sinners and took the punishment meant for the guilty. It wasn't just Barabbas who walked away that day—it was all of us. That moment in the courtyard wasn't an accident of politics or mob pressure. It was mercy, deliberate and divine. The innocent was condemned, so that the guilty could go free. That's the Gospel.

For Reflection:

- · Why would the crowd release Barabbas?
- Have you ever seen God's hand after the fact in something you thought was in your control?

Prayer:

Lord Jesus, we often find sinners more relatable than our sinless Savior. Forgive us. Help us recognize your grace, even when we fail to understand it. Teach us to cling to you, the one true Savior. Amen.

GROUP TIME: AZ LCMC Church Fellowship Pr. Denton Bennet

As we have been discussing small groups within the Victory Lutheran Church family more and more, I wanted to take a moment to share with you how that same mindset extends even to the life of the larger church within LCMC. As a church, Victory belongs to LCMC, an international association of congregations that share the same goal: to live out our faith in the freedom of Christ, as best represented through the Lutheran Confessions. This is a different mindset for many who grew up in the Lutheran church, as we no longer belong to a

"synod" that groups congregations together geographically under a larger organizational structure.

However, districts and fellowships are two of the vehicles that congregations can use to initiate cooperation and mutual support. Congregational leaders can come together to share ideas, resources, and support in ways that are most beneficial to one another's mission. Victory is part of the Arizona Fellowship, a group of LCMC congregations whose pastors and ministry leaders meet monthly at a rotation of host churches. So far in 2025, Victory has hosted this event twice, with guest speakers Mike Bradley, the outgoing LCMC service coordinator, in February, and Julie Smith, the newly appointed LCMC service coordinator, in May.
