Life Notes

Experience the Gifts of Christmas #3: "Joy" - Philippians 4:1, 4-9

Opener:

Think about a time that you received a gift that brought you joy. What was it about the gift that brought you this sense of joy? How long did the feeling last?

Go Deeper: (Exploring the Bible)

1. Read Philippians 4:4-9. What in this passage immediately jumps out at you? Read it again. What did you hear this second time? Read it a third time focusing on the "why" Paul was rejoicing. What did you discover?
2. Paul wrote the letter to the Philippians while he was in prison. What does this unfortunate circumstance tell you about Paul's source of joy?
3. Read Luke 2:10-12. You are very familiar with this verse. What is the reason for the "great" joy? Who is this great joy for?
4. Read Psalm 118:24. How can we feel joy on this day even if it contains troubles? What is the difference between joy and happiness?
5. Read Nehemiah 8:10. Who gives us strength? What are the pitfalls of believing we can do things on our own?

Live It: (Applying to Our Lives)

1. Describe a time when you felt the burden of having to put on a facade and faking joy that you didn't feel. What happened?
2. Reflect on the understanding that joy isn't a feeling. It's a gift. It's a state of being. In what ways does this change your perception of joy?
3. In the sermon it was said that the Holy Spirit brings the fullness of joy to believers, giving us an inner sense of well-being, peace, and joy that are not dependent on external circumstances. How does this truth change you in your current circumstances?
4. We often think we have to do things - pray more, forgive more, be grateful more, in order to experience God's gift of joy. With your new understanding that joy is a gift that comes from God without strings attached (because it is a gift), how does this change your "To Do List?"
5. This is a difficult time of year for so many. Who do you know who needs to hear this message that "the joy of the Lord is our strength"?

GOD TIME: The Joy of Being Loved

"For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." – John 3:16

Joy seems like an odd word for people who know pain. Yet the angels announced Jesus' birth with "good news that will cause great joy" (Luke 2:10). Not happiness dependent on circumstances, but joy—the deep gladness that comes from knowing we are loved by God. This is the joy Mary sang about, the joy shepherds ran to find, the joy that drew wise men across continents.

Because here's the truth Advent screams: Love came down at Christmas. Not just any love, but the kind that leaves heaven's glory for a manger. The kind that seeks out shepherds and sinners. The kind that won't let death have the final word.

This is why joy and love are inseparable in the Christmas story. We experience true joy when we grasp how deeply we are loved—not for what we've accomplished, but simply because we are His. "We love because he first loved us" (1 John 4:19). Our joy isn't manufactured; it's the natural response to being found, known, and cherished by the God who came near.

As we light the final candles of Advent, we celebrate this: You are loved with an everlasting love. That love took on flesh and entered our darkness. And because of that love, joy—real, lasting, unshakeable joy—is yours.

Reflect: How does knowing you are unconditionally loved by God change your perspective today? Where might His love be inviting you to experience deeper joy this Christmas?

Prayer: Loving Father, thank You for loving us enough to send Your Son. Fill our hearts with the joy that comes from knowing we are Yours. Help us share this love and joy with everyone we meet. In Jesus' name, Amen.






GROUP TIME: Winter Bible Study in Romans 9–16 January 12–March 2, Mondays @ 10am & 6pm

This winter, we step back into the depths of Paul's Letter to the Romans—a book Martin Luther once called "the chief part of the New Testament and the very purest Gospel." Last year, our study of chapters 1–8 helped us lay bedrock truths about sin, grace, justification, and life in the Spirit. Now we continue the journey with Foundations, exploring the final eight chapters, Romans 9–16.

If Romans 1–8 gave us the solid footing, then Romans 9–16 call us to keep excavating—digging down into the layers of God's mercy and the shape of Spirit-led living. In Romans 9–11, Paul opens the mystery of God's sovereign purpose: His unwavering faithfulness to Israel, His patience with all people, and His relentless commitment to redeem through Christ. Romans 12–15 then move from doctrine to daily life, showing what happens when the Gospel is poured into the cracks and corners of ordinary living: presenting ourselves as living sacrifices; being transformed in mind and character; using our gifts humbly; loving sincerely; blessing enemies; submitting to authorities; resisting the darkness; and pursuing unity within Christ's Body. Chapter 16 closes by naming ordinary believers whose lives became part of God's sacred foundation stones—reminding us that doctrine always leads to discipleship.

Luther said of Romans: "The more one deals with this Epistle, the more precious it becomes and the better it tastes." My prayer is that as we keep digging, you will discover even richer treasures of God's grace.
