Opener:

5. How does the cross define love differently than culture does?

Live It: (Applying to Our Lives)

1. What makes it difficult for you to receive God's love fully?
2. Where do you most need to experience Christ's love right now?
3. Who might God be inviting you to love sacrificially this week?
4. How does knowing you are already beloved change your faith?
5. What would it look like to let Christ's love overflow naturally?



GOD TIME: X Marks the Christ

Every December, the shorthand "Xmas" shows up—on cards, signs, and store displays. For many Christians, it can feel like a loss. Replace *Christmas* with *Xmas*, and it seems as though Christ Himself has been crossed out. Another reminder, perhaps, of how easily the holy can be reduced to the hurried, the sacred trimmed down to save space.

That concern is understandable. Words matter. Names matter. And the name of Jesus matters most. But there is also another way to see that X—one that actually leads us deeper into the story of Christ, not farther away from it.


The X in *Xmas* comes from Greek, the original language of the New Testament. Christ in Greek is Χριστός (Christos). The first letter of that word is Chi, which looks exactly like our English X. Early Christians often paired Chi with the next letter, Rho (P), forming the Chi-Rho symbol.

This ancient symbol was one of the earliest visual confessions of faith, proclaiming that Jesus is the Christ. Far from erasing Jesus, the X was once a bold declaration of Him.

The apostle Paul writes, "For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 3:11). Whether spelled out fully or written in ancient shorthand, Christ remains the foundation, the center, the meaning.

So perhaps this season, when you see *Xmas*, let it be a reminder—not of what's missing, but of what cannot be removed. Christ is still there. He always is. And He always will be.
