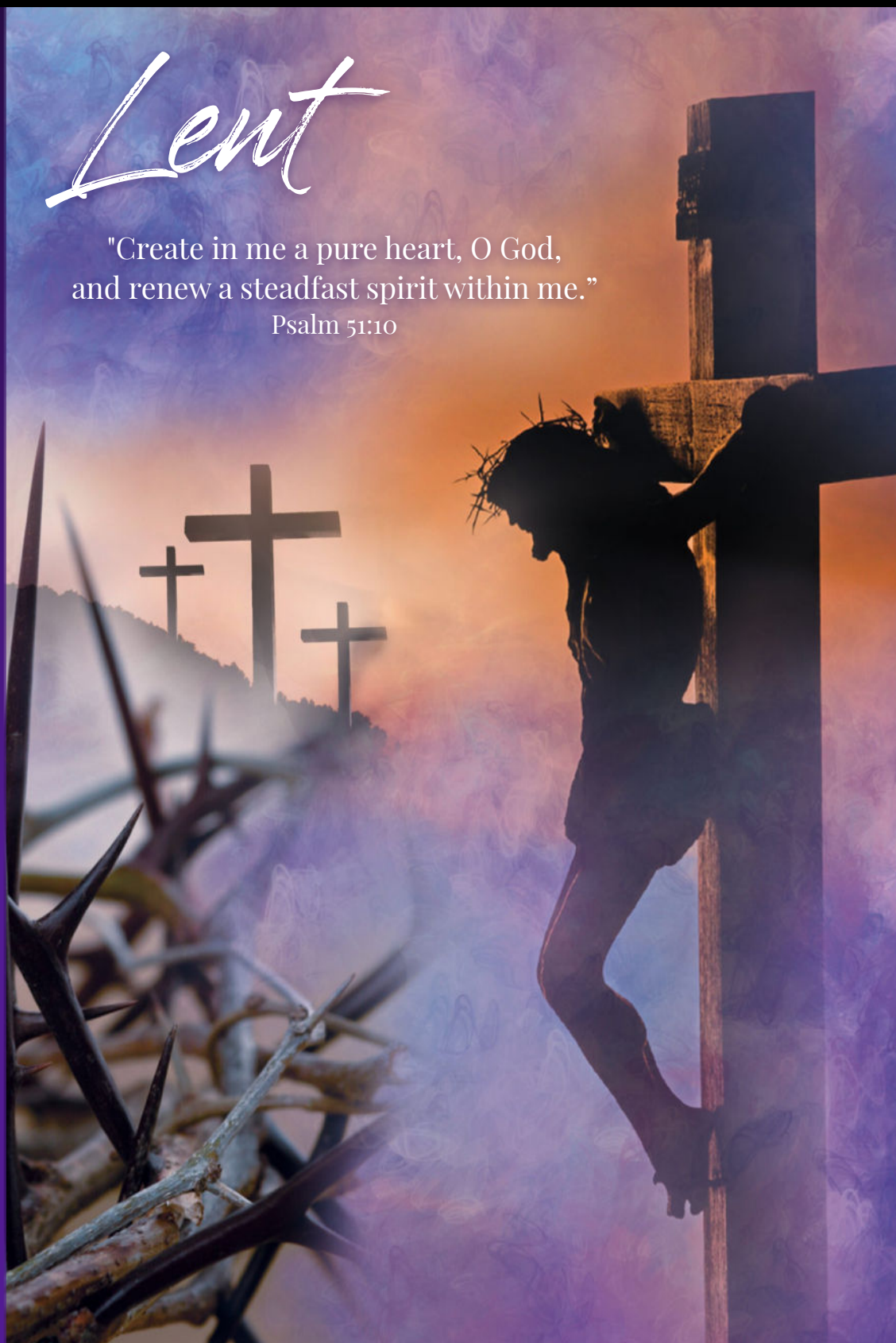

Dear Church Family,

Lent has a way of taking us by the hand and walking us into places we don't always choose on our own: honesty, confession, waiting, and hope. This year, we're taking that journey with a very old companion—the Psalms. Our Lenten devotional, *Out of the Depths: 40 Days of Lenten Reflections from the Psalms*, is an invitation to pray words God has already given His people for every season of life: joy, fear, anger, gratitude, doubt, repentance, and praise. When we don't have the words, the Psalms speak for us.

Some of you are walking through green pastures right now. Others feel like Psalm 130—"out of the depths"—where guilt, grief, or sheer exhaustion has made the days feel heavy. The beauty of Lent is that it doesn't ask you to pretend. It simply brings you to Jesus as you are. And it keeps bringing you back to this: the "scoreboard" of your sin doesn't get the final word—because Christ carried that record to the cross.

So let's do this together—day by day and week by week. In our devotional lives, let's open the Psalms, pray honestly, and let God's Word put steel in our faith and tenderness in our repentance. And then let's gather, too: midweek Lenten services and weekend worship, shoulder to shoulder as a church family, following Jesus' footsteps—one scene, one promise, one mercy at a time—until we arrive at His cross.

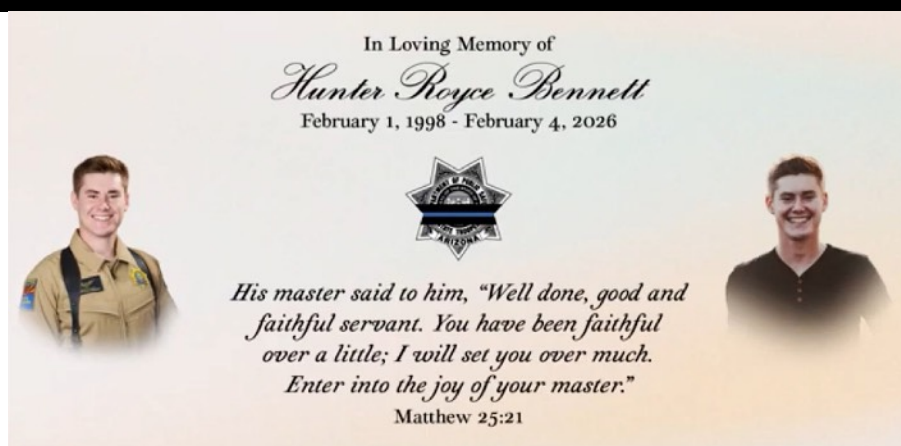
Read slowly. Tell the truth. And then cling—stubbornly—to the better truth: "With the LORD is unfailing love, and with Him is full redemption."

IN LOVING MEMORY OF HUNTER R. BENNETT

February 4, 2026, brought a tragedy our hearts still struggle to hold: the downing of Ranger 56, the Arizona Department of Public Safety helicopter, and the deaths of Pilot Robert Skankey and DPS Trooper/Paramedic Hunter R. Bennett—the son of Pastor Renée and Jeff Bennett. The loss is crushing. The questions rise up fast and loud, and so many of them remain unanswered. And it's right here—when the storm is at its worst, when a parent faces what no parent should ever have to face—that faith in Jesus Christ is not merely a comfort we reach for, but an anchor we cling to: the only sure hold that can keep a heart from breaking apart in the waves of grief.

More than 2,000 gathered for Hunter Bennett's memorial—including hundreds from law enforcement—a visible reminder that a single life, faithfully lived, radiates far beyond what years alone can measure. As Colonel Glover said about Hunter, "His years were too few, but his impact was immeasurable." Glover remarked that Hunter himself captured it best when he once spoke of leaving "a name that inspires confidence and a legacy beyond reproach." By every account, he did.

The service held both heartbreak and holy hope. Pastor Renée's words linger: "It's not the number of years that you live but how you live the number of years you're given. Hunter's was too short, but his light was so bright." Jeff reminded us that "Hunter saved a lot of lives that night. To know Hunter was to know a man who truly lived."

In worship the day before, we reflected on John 11—that when Jesus delays, He is not absent; when Jesus weeps, God is not distant; and when Jesus calls, death does not get the final word. That truth carried weight at Hunter's final call: "11215 is 10-7. Your assignment on earth is completed. Your new assignment is to be with God. Thank you, Hunter. You will be in our hearts and minds forever. God's speed."

The silence, the honor guard, the words "Well done, good and faithful servant. Rest easy, Trooper Bennett. We have the watch from here"—all testified to both grief and gratitude.

Victory was honored to host the livestream so many could participate in remembering Hunter. And we remain committed to what matters most now: steady prayer, quiet presence, and enduring love for Pastor Renee, Jeff, and their family.

Clear skies and tail winds, Ranger 56. Christ has the final word.

FAREWELL TO PASTOR RENÉE BENNETT

On February 16, 2026, on behalf of Victory Lutheran Church, I accepted Pastor Renee Bennett's resignation from her role as our Discipleship Pastor. While this news brings a sense of loss to our entire Victory family, we receive it with understanding, compassion, and deep gratitude for the two years Pastor Renee faithfully served among us.

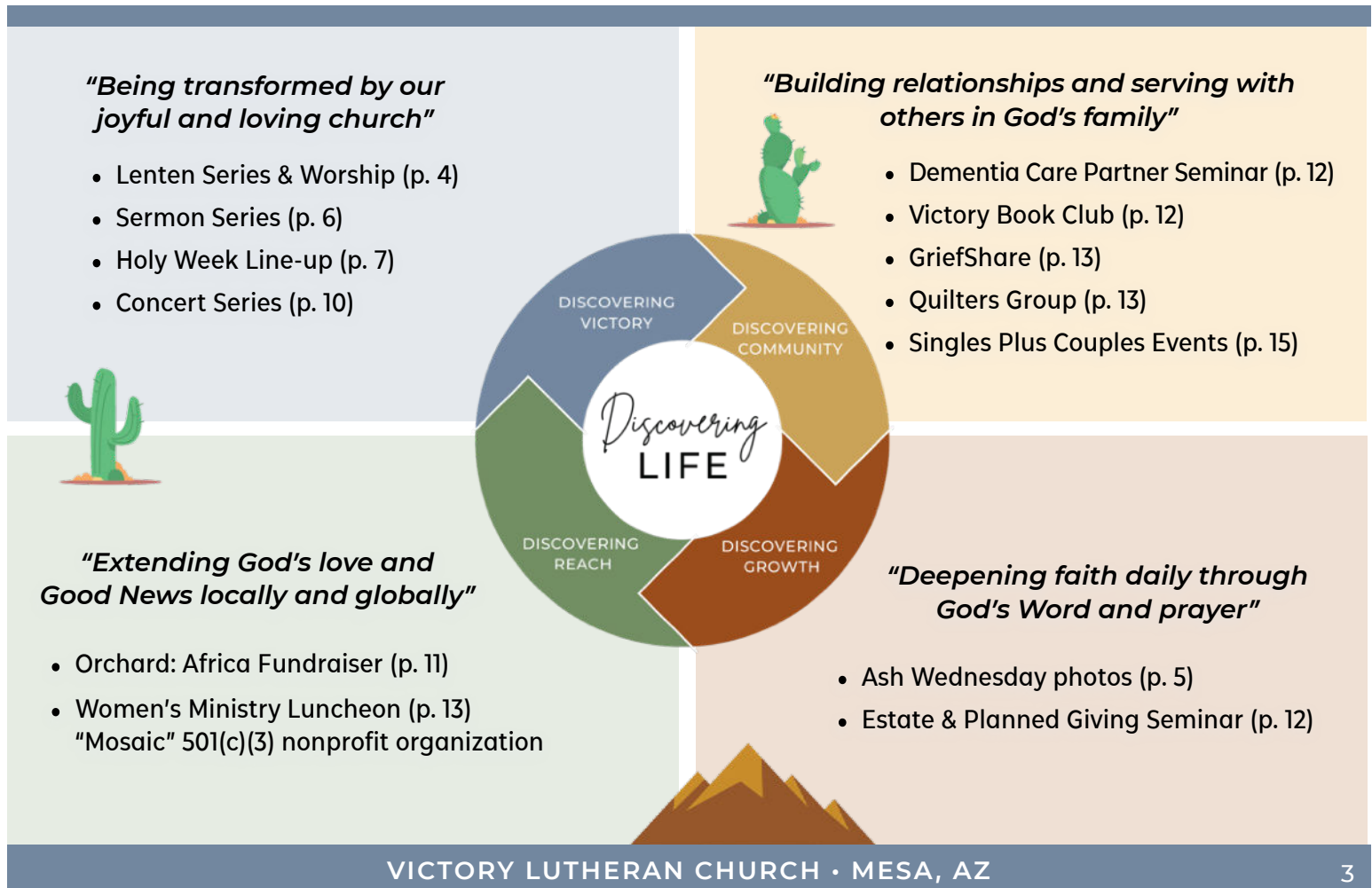
Pastor Renée came to Victory on February 1, 2024, and from her very first day, she brought a passionate commitment to proclaiming the Gospel, administering the sacraments, and walking alongside our congregation with genuine love and care. Over these two years, she has been a steady, grace-filled presence — in our pulpits, at our bedsides, teaching confirmation, and in the lives of those navigating grief, illness, and the journey of faith. Her theology was sound, her heart was tender, and her love for this congregation was evident in everything she did.

Pastor Renée's resignation comes not from a desire to leave, but from a place of deep personal need. She and her husband, Jeff, are facing an extremely difficult family situation, and in her own words, she is no longer able to commit to providing "the level of care and support that our Victory family needs and deserves." We honor that honesty. We honor that sacrifice. And we hold her and Jeff in our prayers as they walk through this season.

Pastor Renée leaves us anchored in the same hope she always preached — the promise of Jeremiah 29:11, that God has plans to prosper us and not to harm us, plans to give us a hope and a future. That confidence in God's faithfulness is perhaps her greatest gift to us, and it is one we carry forward.

On behalf of the entire Victory family: Pastor Renée, thank you. Thank you for your proclamation of the Gospel, your shepherding of our souls, and your love for a congregation that will not soon forget you. We release you with our blessing, our prayers, and our deepest gratitude. May God continue to meet you and Jeff with His faithful, unwavering grace.

LENTEN SERMON SERIES: OUT OF THE DEPTHS

Wednesday, March 4

"When Your Bones Ache" - Psalm 6

There's a weariness that goes deeper than tired—when grief soaks your pillow every night and even your bones feel the weight of sorrow. The psalmist doesn't sugarcoat it: sometimes following God means walking through valleys where tears are your only companion and questions outnumber answers. But even here, especially here, we learn that God doesn't love us less in our weakness; He loves us through it.

Wednesday, March 11

"The Wounds We Carry" - Psalm 38

What do you do when the weight of your own failures becomes too heavy to bear, when even your closest friends step back, and the silence of heaven feels deafening? This is the raw honesty of Lent—acknowledging that our sin has real consequences, our wounds run deep, and sometimes we stand utterly alone with our guilt. Yet the cross proves that God doesn't wait for us to clean ourselves up; He meets us in our mess with wounds that heal our own.

Wednesday, March 18

"Fading Away" - Psalm 102

When you feel like you're disappearing—your strength gone, your purpose unclear, your prayers bouncing off the ceiling—you're closer to the cross than you realize. The afflicted one who wrote this psalm felt forgotten, withering away while the world moved on without noticing. This is the cry of everyone who's ever felt invisible, and it's the very place where Jesus became most visible, bearing the weight of our fading into his own body on the cross.

Wednesday, March 25

"Satisfied In You" - Psalm 42

Why does your soul feel so dry when you're surrounded by people telling you God should be enough? The psalmist's honesty cuts through the pretense: sometimes our thirst for God feels more like drowning in His absence, and our memories of His presence only sharpen the pain of His seeming distance. Lent doesn't promise to quench this thirst immediately—it invites us to bring our desperate, honest longing to the only one who can satisfy it, even when the wait feels unbearable.

SERMON SERIES: STEPS TO THE CROSS

During Lent, our weekend worship will focus on Jesus' footsteps to the cross—His cross. But ours, too. We follow Him down that hard road, watching again and again as Jesus' kingdom collides with the kingdoms of this world—Pilate's politics, the high priests' pressure, and the crowd's fear-driven loyalty. God's reign is stronger than all of it, even when it looks powerless in a courtroom and even when "truth" is treated like a nuisance; so Jesus stays obedient, entrusting Himself to the Father and continuing steadily toward the cross. And when the crowd trades faith for Caesar, and Jesus is crucified beneath the mocking sign "King of the Jews," buried quietly in a garden, we're left with this holy tension: it looks like the world has won—but the true power of God's kingdom is already at work, and it's about to be revealed.

February 28 & March 1, 2026

"Jesus Serves" - John 13:1-17

On the night Jesus knew His "hour" had come, He took a towel and washed His disciples' feet—showing that serving isn't a side virtue for Him, but the driving force of His Messianic leadership on the way to the cross. Psalm 51 reminds us that before we can serve like Jesus, we first must be washed by Jesus—cleansed by His mercy and given a clean heart. Then He calls us to walk in His footsteps: to take the low place, die to self, and serve others sacrificially as the cross-shaped way of life.

March 7 & 8, 2026

"Jesus Is Abandoned" - John 18:12-27

Jesus is led deeper into the high priest's courts—alone, bound, and already tasting the abandonment that will culminate at the cross—while Peter, trying to stay close, ends up distancing himself with three painful denials. Psalm 17 gives voice to what Jesus is living in real time: an innocent sufferer entrusting Himself to the Father—"hear the right, O Lord... show Your steadfast love"—when human strength and human loyalty collapse. And if we see ourselves in Peter (warming our hands by the world's fire, choosing self-preservation over confession), this is the mercy that holds: Jesus is abandoned and denied so that failures like us are not finally forsaken, but called back, forgiven, and made faithful again.

March 14 & 15, 2026

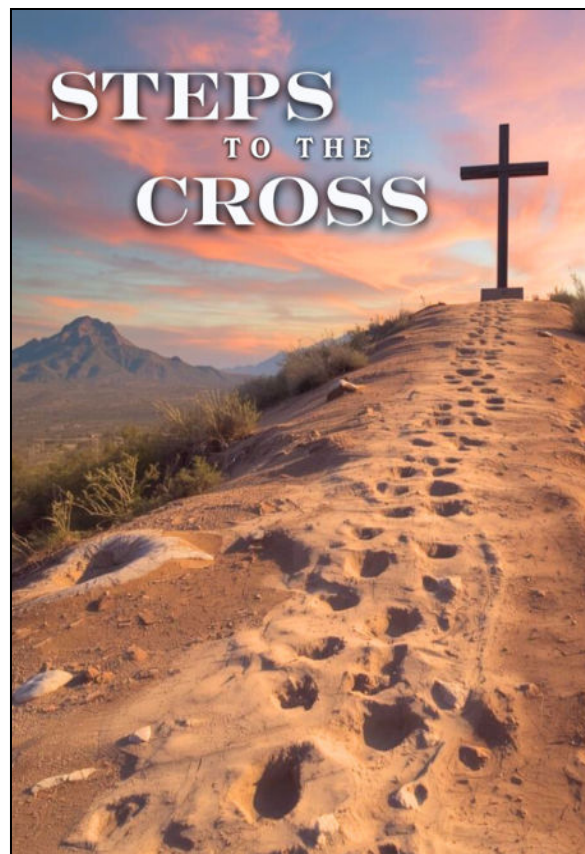
"Jesus Before Pilate" - John 18:28-40

Jesus stands before Pilate—calm, bruised, and steady—while the powers of this world posture and accuse, and He quietly declares that His kingdom is not from this world and that He has come to testify to the truth. Psalm 145 lifts our eyes above the courtroom drama to the deeper reality: the Lord's kingdom is the one that truly endures—an everlasting dominion even when everything looks like it's spinning out of control. And when Pilate shrugs, "I find no case against Him," we hear the strange comfort of the Gospel: the truly innocent King is treated as guilty, so that guilty people like us can be welcomed into His unshakable kingdom of grace.

March 21 & 22, 2026

"Jesus Is Sentenced" - John 19:1-16

Jesus' trial reaches its bitter end as the shouts of "Crucify Him!" drown out justice, and yet—through mocking soldiers, a thorny "crown," and Pilate's reluctant words—the truth keeps slipping out: Jesus really is the King. Psalm 146 steadies us here, reminding us not to place our trust in princes or public opinion, because the only ruler who never fails is the Lord who reigns forever and defends the helpless. And this is the comfort that meets us in the chaos: our true King is sentenced in our place, choosing a crown of thorns now so that sinners like us can share His everlasting kingdom later.



HOLY WEEK

Holy Week: Journey from Cross to Empty Tomb

Join the Victory community as we journey through the final days of Christ's passion—beginning with the joyful shouts of Palm Sunday and culminating in the glorious celebration of His resurrection on Easter morning. Each

service throughout Holy Week carries a unique atmosphere and invites us into deeper reflection on Jesus' final days and eternal love.

PALM SUNDAY—A Triumphant Beginning: Holy Week begins as we wave palm branches and shout "Hosanna!" remembering Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. While the crowds celebrated their long-awaited King, they did not yet understand that the story would soon travel through suffering before reaching victory.

MAUNDY THURSDAY—Remembering the Last Supper and Garden Prayer: On Maundy Thursday, we recall the night Jesus reinterpreted the Passover and gave us the meal of remembrance. Following dinner, they went to the Garden of Gethsemane, and there He prayed. He prayed for you. Our services include communion. Then, as the service ends, the stripping of the altar symbolizes the stripping away of Jesus' earthly life.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS— A Personal Journey: Stations of the Cross will be open in the Fellowship Hall on both Maundy Thursday and Good Friday from 3–8pm. These interactive stations provide a quiet, contemplative space for personal devotion, with scripture, reflections, and hands-on elements to help you meditate on the sacrifice Jesus made for you. There will be an opportunity to place a nail in the cross as you accept His gift for you.

GOOD FRIDAY— Eternal Rest, Eternal Light: Our Good Friday service is a solemn and powerful Tenebrae experience—"tenebrae" meaning darkness. Through the music of John Rutter's "Requiem," choir and orchestra will lead us in a musical service reflecting on the sacrifice of Jesus and hope of eternal life. This unique service includes readings, time for meditation, and reflection. Candles are gradually extinguished, symbolizing the deepening darkness as Christ approached death.

EASTER SUNRISE—Sonrise!: Begin Easter morning outdoors at our 6am Sunrise Service, a beloved tradition at Victory. As the sun rises, we celebrate Christ's resurrection with communion, music by our Handbell Ensemble, and a message of hope as the Light breaks the power of darkness. A continental breakfast follows from 6:45–7:45am in the Fellowship Hall.

EASTER WEEKEND SERVICES—Jesus Is Risen!: After walking through the sorrow and sacrifice of Holy Week, we gather in joy, hope, and triumph to celebrate the empty tomb and the new life Christ offers. Our lead pastor will be preaching from John 20, and the Traditional Easter services include soloists, choir and brass on Saturday 4pm and Sunday 8am & 9:30am. If you could use extra time to park or want to get a better seat, the 8am service will be exactly the same as 9:30am. Contemporary worship is at 11am. Children's Church is available at 9:30 and 11am.

WORSHIP WITH US NEAR OR FAR: If you have family or friends out of town that you would like to invite to worship with us, we will be live-streaming Holy Week. Visit victorylutheran.com/easter for more information. We look forward to experiencing the journey from cross to empty tomb with you!

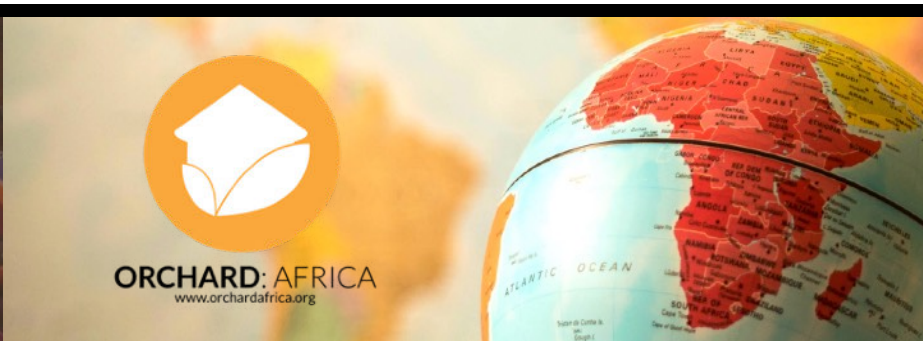

A Gift Worth Giving: The Blessing of Funeral Preplanning

I remember the phone call like it was yesterday. My dad was gone, and in an instant, our family was swept into a grief we weren't prepared for. What I didn't expect was how quickly the practical demands of death would press in on us — even in those first raw hours of loss.

While we were still processing the shock, still reaching for one another in disbelief, the questions started coming. What kind of service did he want? Where? Who should speak? What songs meant something to him? What readings? What flowers? Each decision felt impossibly heavy because we were making them through tears, without a roadmap. My dad had shared a couple of wishes with my mom — that he wanted to be cremated and his ashes buried in a cemetery. And I'll tell you, even that small amount of guidance was an anchor in the storm. But the rest of us kids didn't know. It was a surprise to us, and in that moment of grief, even a loving surprise carries weight. We were grateful for what he had shared — and it made us realize just how much more we wished we had known.

That experience changed how I think about one of the most loving things any of us can do for the people we leave behind.

A Final Act of Love

Preplanning your funeral isn't a morbid exercise — it's a profound gift. It's a way of saying to your children, your spouse, your family: *I love you too much to leave you guessing.*

Scripture speaks clearly about the wisdom of preparation. In Proverbs 21:5, we read, *"The plans of the diligent lead to profit as surely as haste leads to poverty."* There is a quiet dignity in thinking ahead, in ordering our affairs with care and intentionality. And Ecclesiastes 3:1-2 reminds us that *"there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens — a time to be born and a time to die."* Death is not a surprise to God. We need not be surprised by it either.

The Apostle Paul, writing from prison and facing his own mortality, said with remarkable peace in Philippians 1:21, *"For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain."* That kind of confidence — rooted in the resurrection hope we share as believers — is exactly what allows us to talk about death without fear, and to prepare for it without dread.

When we preplan, we don't just spare our families from impossible decisions made in the fog of grief. We also get to tell our story one last time. We get to choose the hymns that carried us through hard seasons, the scriptures that anchored our faith, the words we want spoken over us as we are laid to rest. We get to make sure that our funeral service reflects not just who we were, but *whose* we were.

It's Easier Than You Think

Here at Victory, we want to make this process as simple and meaningful as possible. We have put together a funeral planning packet that will walk you through everything step by step — guiding you through your wishes in a thoughtful and unhurried way, and giving your family the clarity and comfort they will need when the time comes.

Simply stop by the church office to pick up your packet. There is no pressure and no appointment needed — just take one home, fill it out at your own pace, and know that you have given your family one of the most loving gifts imaginable. I genuinely encourage every one of you to

take this step. Don't let your family face what mine faced — scrambling for answers while their hearts are breaking.

A Hope That Anchors Everything

As Christians, we plan for our funerals from a place of hope, not fear. Jesus said in John 11:25-26, *"I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die."* That promise changes everything. It means our funeral services are not just endings — they are declarations of faith, celebrations of a life lived in grace, and a testimony to a resurrection that is coming.

So plan well. Plan with hope. And give your family the gift of knowing exactly how to honor you when that day arrives.

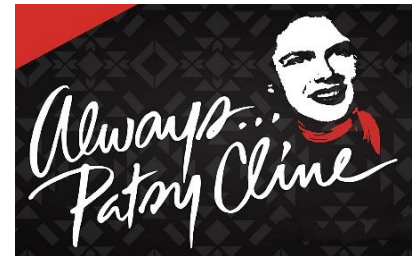
